
The very popular Teddy Bears picnic will be held in early April 2022.

On reflection, the past year has been a year of focus around our unique story, purpose and how we communicate our potential to New Zealand and the world. Telling our story well does everything we need to succeed...

Douglas Cook created something beautiful from the depths of war for all New Zealanders and adapted his purpose for global tree conservation. HB Williams' gift and foresight to ensure our collection is secured into the future was visionary.

We have begun to express these key messages in everything that we do and how we communicate. The impact of our story is so powerful and intrinsic to our being, that we are starting to experience powerful feedback and interactions. These vary from word-of-mouth recommendations for our guided tours through to being accepted as a Level 2 accredited collection via ArbNet, the worldwide interactive community of Arboreta.

Amplification of these messages will take centre stage with the newly created Awareness and Fundraising Campaign called "Trees for our Future". This campaign is bold and ambitious. The 'Awareness' aspect will target all of our potentially aligned partners and supporters with aims to increase research, connectivity and collaboration to advance global tree conservation. The 'Fundraising' aspect will focus on areas of long-term partnering and shorter-term needs. It will clearly define how any special donation will be used and give the donor options on where their gift can add value to our general maintenance, capital projects, annual fundraiser or our endowment funds – the Eastwoodhill Reserve Fund and/or our Special Interest Sunrise Endowment fund (https://www.sunrisefoundation.org.nz/sunrise-funds/funds/).

A successful campaign will educate all stakeholders about Eastwoodhill and our purpose to support global tree conservation via our Arboreal Ark process and:

- allow us to employ seven new staff members over the next five years and a projected 16 in total, forecasted in an ideal scenario into the future, with the focus of maintaining the collection,
- focus our efforts to continue capital infrastructure projects such as the continuation of the Link Road, building a new multi-purpose building for research and conferences, increasing accommodation and improving the organisation,
- include annual fundraising campaigns that will focus on items or projects less than \$100k, such as a new electric tour bus, a piece of machinery or a smaller infrastructure project,

bolster our endowment funds.

Supporting these messages will be our new branding. Coupled with our new logo, the brand will clearly designate and represent our organisation in all our activities. A huge thank you to Draggnett Design for their creativity and the sub-committee for working through the options and details. A new website is also being created to reflect the branding and "Trees for our Future" campaign.

Our amplification also took place across New Zealand at numerous events:

- November 2020 Marion attended and presented at the Tauranga Garden Festival

- March 2021 I attended the NZ Farm Forestry Conference.

Other achievements in the last year:

The Link Road (Phase One) was tendered in 2020-21 and completed in May of this financial year. A great asset and start to this one-million-dollar project. Phase One is 900 meters long and will eventually link the whole arboretum, with the Masterplan aim to access all Eco-Zones and Eco-Regions our collection represents.

The revalidation of the collection has advanced and 20% has been re-inspected. It is important for us to have a clear overview of the current condition of our trees from a tree health perspective and safety purposes for our visitors and other assets.

We posted our highest ever visitor numbers for the financial year which is an awesome achievement.

On reflection we have had a huge effort in the past 12 months that will hopefully amplify, connect and increase our funding over the next five years. I ask all of our supporters to help spread the message and direct people to our website and various social media.

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Chicken Pie

Provided by Kaye Williams our wonderful Chair of the Friends.

Ingredients

2 tablespoons butter

4 rashers bacon

Tin mushrooms or fresh

Herbs- thyme and rosemary all chopped

2 stalks celery and/or leeks, or any vegetables

1 cup white wine

Cornflour for thickening mixed with 1½ cups of water

12 boneless, skinless chicken thighs chopped into thirds

Salt and pepper

Filo pastry

Method

Pre-heat oven to 180°C.

Melt butter, cook bacon, all vegetables until soft, add mushrooms and herbs. Add wine and cornflour and stir until sauce thickens. Season well.

Put all into a shallow casserole dish and stir in the

Filo pastry - scrunch up sheets of buttered pastry and pop on top.

Bake for 40 minutes.

Heavenly Delights!

Zucchini, Chocolate and Coconut Slice

Base ingredients

110g butter (at room temperature)

¾ cup sugar

1½ cups flours (sifted)

Topping ingredients

3 eggs

1½ cups grated raw zucchini (about 1 large zucchini)

2 cups brown sugar (firmly packed)

1½ cups coconut thread

70g slivered almonds

½ cup chocolate chips

1½ teaspoons vanilla essence

3 tablespoons flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

Pinch salt

Base method

Preheat oven to 190°C. Cream butter and sugar. Add flour and mix until the dough starts to come together. Transfer mixture to a greased 24cm x 30cm pan and press it down to cover the base. Bafe for 10–15 minutes.

Topping method

Beat eggs, add zucchini, sugar, coconut, almonds, chocolate chips and vanilla essence. Mix together flour, baking powder and salt. Add zucchini mixture and combine. Spread zucchini mixture over cooked base and bake for 25–30 minutes, until the top is golden. Cool completely before cutting.

Eastwoodhill Memories

My relationship with Eastwoodhill began in 1965 when Dad purchased the property "to prevent it being destroyed and put back into farmland". Dad's passion for trees and shrubs included us all as a family. We would all go together to help eradicate the thorny acacia tree problem out there, usually in the autumn holidays.

Mum would pack up a picnic lunch- bacon and egg pie, Anzac biscuits and/or sultana cake, fruit, and thermoses for cups of tea. Dad would pack in pruners, leather gloves (for the thorns were very vicious), chainsaws, matches and paper, and a small can of petrol or diesel to start the fire. To think now how dangerous that was for Eastwoodhill!

We mostly worked in Pear Park, then up in The Dell where the memorial stands now. Dad and Marcus on the chainsaws – the rest of us carefully pruning the larger branches into smaller manageable pieces, then picking up and stacking the prunings into heaps for burning. Stock were, in those days, grazing under the canopy of trees, so it was deemed too dangerous to leave the prunings lying

around, for the thorns can create a nasty wound which then can fester.

A welcome lunch beside the fire, which was started almost immediately so that we could tend it all day – green prunings burn just as well as dry, as the sap carries the fire – this lesson learnt at that time.

We'd carry on until around afternoon tea time, tending the fire till it died down and we could go home knowing it was out and Eastwoodhill safe; tired and feeling very pleased with ourselves, with fire-kissed faces, and

There are currently 151 globally threatened species in our collection.

Our Arboreal Arc protects and ensures protection for 151 globally threatened species from 67 countries the collection currently represents.

In the 2020-2021 year the Friends donated a total of \$37,744 to Eastwoodhill. 44 educational groups came through the gates totalling 1309 visitors, mainly children.

A total of 10,938 visitors came through the arboretum in the last year.
